Faith & Practice

Unfortunately, we are all at risk of "spiritual leprosy." This "leprosy" is sin. When we consciously commit sin, we become infected with "spiritual leprosy." The cure for this spiritual leprosy is faith in Jesus Christ. Today it is worth asking yourself a question: Do I really want to be free from sin? Am I ready to cry out to God and ask Him for healing? Today's Gospel suggests four steps to finding healing from the spiritual leprosy of sin. First, admit your disease of sin. The story of the leper shows that he was aware of his illness and therefore begged Jesus for healing. So, do I know my sin? Do I know I need healing? Are you ready to ask for it? We live in times where sin is often disregarded. We often justify our sins and blame others. We explain to ourselves that "others" sin more. If we do not acknowledge the terminal illness and medical diagnosis, we will not be healthy. Likewise, not acknowledging our sin will not make us better. The way out of this situation is to accept the truth about yourself. Like the leper from the Gospel, we must start with the first step, admit our weakness, and humbly ask God for help. The second step is to establish a relationship with Jesus. The leper calls on Jesus, seeks a relationship with Jesus, knowing that it can heal him. The Evangelist says that Jesus, moved with pity, stretched out his hand, touched him. The word "pity" comes from the Latin word "pietas" and refers to family love. Jesus sees this man as a brother and behaves towards him in this way. Touch is reserved for people close to you. Touching a leper was unthinkable. If we want to be free from the leprosy of our sin, we must allow ourselves to enter into a relationship with Jesus and allow Him to touch our hearts. The third step is to apply spiritual medicine. After healing the leper, Jesus orders him to go to the priest. In the Jewish community, the decision to readmit a person after healing was made by the priest. We can read this as a reference to the sacrament of confession. In the confessional, the priest assesses a person's spiritual condition. Through the priest's service, God heals the soul of man who, having received absolution, returns to full communion in the Church. To us, spiritual lepers, Jesus gives the same command: Go, show yourselves to the priest... In other words: "Go to confession." The final fourth step of spiritual cleansing is to tell someone about it. Maybe this doesn't fit with what Jesus asked the leper to do. He asked him to be silent, and he announced his healing throughout the area. What does this mean for us? That there are things that cannot be hidden. One of them is conversion.
